### BACKGROUND

[The Department of Social Services](#) started as the Department of Public Welfare in 1939, the Welfare Board was the local administrative agency for public assistance (Chapter 99, Acts of 1939). The Department of Public Welfare assumed welfare responsibilities from the Welfare Board in 1967, and was renamed the Department of Social Services in 1968 (Chapter 148, Acts of 1967; Chapter 702, Acts of 1968). Today, the Maryland Department of Human Services (DHS) is the State's primary social service provider, which operates through its 24 local departments of social services.

The Director of the local Department administers programs subject to the supervision, direction, and control of the Social Services Administration, and the Family Investment Administration.

The County Executive appoints the Director with the approval of the Secretary of Human Services and the advice of the Prince George's County Social Services Board (Code Human Services Article, secs. 3-101 through 3-303; County Charter, sec. 554).

In FY 2024, the Administration Office provided general oversight of State and County funded programs and services. Dual (State and County) financial, procurement, personnel, and automation functions are administered and maintained. This division also regulated and monitored program and service policies and procedures. The Office of Strategic Partnerships and Community Solutions is housed within this division which is a county cash contribution/cash match for community resource advocate positions in the public schools. The budget for this activity is funded by a grant from the Board of Education.
