Organization Name	Amount	Grant Purpose
Anacostia Watershed Society	\$3,000	Anacostia Watershed Society will use grant funds for expenses related to encouraging students and teachers from University Park and Riverdale Elementary Schools in classroom education, field experiences on the river, and hands-on stewardship activities.
ARC of Prince George's County, Inc.	\$2,500	ARC of Prince George's County will use grant funds for expenses related to supporting all program activities carried out by The ARC that serve to increase community inclusion for individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities. More specifically, funds will be used to conduct program elements that are not covered by the Developmental Disabilities Administration (DDA), including the cost of community activities in arts and recreation; transportation; hiring a new job developer; expanding workshops, internships and job training for transitioning youth; and working to add a new Project SEARCH site in the northern part of the County within the next 18 months.
Beacon Heights Elementary School	\$1,000	Beacon Heights Elementary School will use grant funds for expenses related to purchasing signage and safety equipment to deter parents from driving their cars in areas where students commonly walk. Funds will also be used for the Mural Art Project.
Berwyn Heights Elementary School, PGCPS	\$1,000	Berwyn Heights Elementary School will use grant funds for expenses related to paying for transportation for the school-wide field trip to the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) in Beltsville. The high cost of transportation makes field trips cost-prohibitive for many school students.
B-Roll Media and Arts, Inc.	\$1,500	B-Roll Media and Arts will use grant funds for expenses related to support free of cost media arts training and education to under-resourced youth ages 13-21 and youth with diagnosed learning disabilities in Prince George's County, Maryland.
Christian Life Center	\$3,000	Christian Life Center will use grant funds for expenses related to continuing and expanding the Community Food Project. This initiative aims to end hunger in Prince George's County by providing fresh produce and healthy meals to those in our community experiencing food insecurity.
City of College Park Youth and Family Services	\$4,000	City of College Park, Youth and Family Services will use grant funds for expenses related to providing food and supplies in support of the city's Hispanic Parent Support Group which meets minimum of 46 time a year and is attended on average by 31 parents and 48 children.
Coalition for African Americans in the Performing Arts (CAAPA)	\$1,000	Coalition for African Americans in the Performing Arts (CAAPA) will use grant funds for expenses related to developing and implementing the Performance Series for families, students and children of all ages.

College Park Arts Exchange, Inc.	\$4,000	College Park Arts Exchange (CPAE) will use grant funds for expenses related to supporting the FY19 Children's Programming including Arts Drop-in at four different locations around College Park, its AHA Kids event series for children, College Park Youth Choir and Vocetti, College Park Youth Orchestra and the new band, as well as its Art in Schools project. More specifically, funds will directly support teaching arts who are providing services to those programs, plus materials, including art supplies and the purchase of sheet music. The funds will also allow CPAE to provide scholarships to students with financial need who would not otherwise be able to take part in arts instruction (primarily in the musical performance groups).
Community Advocates for Family & Youth, Inc. (CAFY)	\$1,000	Community Advocates for Family & Youth will use grant funds for expenses related to providing transportation assistance to victims of crime who are without reliable transportation to critical appointments such as protective order hearing, therapeutic counseling sessions and legal appointments.
Community Health Education and Research Corporation	\$1,275	Community Health Education and Research Corporation (CHERC) will use grant funds for expenses related to sponsoring mental health classes for county residents in District 3.
Community Legal Services of Prince George's County, Inc.	\$3,000	Community Legal Services of Prince George's County will use grant funds expenses related to operating its Suitland Clinic outreach to seniors, addressing domestic violence and conducting its Foreclosure Prevention Project, as well as providing its other services.
Congregations United for Compassion and Empowerment	\$2,500	Congregations United for Compassion and Empowerment will use grant funds for expenses related to helping pay the coordinator's salary and a nurse's salary, purchasing client supplies, for clothing, for medical costs and for legal assistance.
Court Appointed Special Advocate (CASA)	\$3,000	Court Appointed Special Advocate (CASA) Prince George's County will use grant funds for expenses related to advocating for the physical health, mental health, safe housing, educational and social needs of 180 children and youth in foster care.
Derek Anthony Moore Charity, Inc.	\$1,500	Derek Anthony Moore Charity, Inc. (DAMCI) will use grant funds for expenses related to supplementing funding of existing and expanding programs benefitting low-income families within Prince George's County, especially Council Districts 3, 4, 5 and 6. More specifically, funds may be used for summer and fall camps for children; for youth conflict resolution, anti-bullying and anti-violence seminars; for youth and young adult career development, workforce readiness training and entrepreneurship programs; and for domestic and family violence programs impacting children.
Embry Center for Family Life	\$2,000	Embry Center for Family Life will use grant funds for expenses related to purchasing educational supplies to support the Building Our Own Success Trail (B.O.O.S.T.) Program. These include grade-level workbooks, dictionaries, educational videos, college preparatory materials and art supplies.
Engaged Community Offshoots, Inc.	\$2,500	Engaged Community Offshoots will use grant funds for expenses related to supporting its staff in demonstrating the many community benefits of producing, and educating about healthy food in Prince George's County.
Family Restoration and Healing Center, Inc.	\$2,000	Family Restoration and Healing Center will use grant funds for expenses related to providing education and supportive services that support job readiness, mental and positive youth development for 130 participants, and job placement, certification or college entry for 70 participants. More specifically, funds will be used for training and for tracking success.

First Generation College Bound	\$4,000	First Generation College Bound will use grant funds for expenses related to conducting the following programs: Homework Club, Great Minds Great Futures Academy, College Access and College Retention.
Food & Friends, Inc.	\$2,000	Food & Friends, Inc. will use grant funds for expenses related to providing medically-tailored, home-delivered meals to those who are too ill to procure or prepare food on their own, as well as providing individualized nutrition counseling, educational handouts and presentations on nutrition related to cancer, diabetes, HIV/AIDS, and other life-challenging illnesses.
Gapbuster, Inc.	\$2,000	GapBuster will use grant funds for expenses related to exposing Prince George's County students to Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM), providing wraparound services to offering English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL) and General Equivalency Diploma (GED) classes, as well for general operating expenses and paying staff.
Glenridge Elementary School	\$1,000	Glenridge Elementary School will use grant funds for expenses related to purchasing books for the classroom libraries.
Habitat for Humanity Metro Maryland, Inc.	\$1,600	Habitat for humanity Metro Maryland will use grant funds for expenses related to purchasing three community trash/ recycling containers to be placed near dog waste stations in the Riverdale Heights, Riverdale Hills, and Crestwood communities.
Hope Connections for Cancer Support	\$1,500	Hope Connections for Cancer Support will use grant funds for expenses related to supplementing its current programming in Prince George's County with additional Gentle Yoga and Pink Ribbon Pilates classes, and providing an interactive nutrition workshop.
Housing Initiative Partnership, Inc.	\$2,000	Housing Initiative Partnership will use grant funds for expenses related to supporting HIP's Rapid Rehousing Program, which provides intensive counseling, education and support to families transitioning out of homelessness.
Liberty's Promise, Inc.	\$4,000	Liberty's Promise will use grant funds for expenses related to supporting after-school programs of civic engagement, held at four Prince George's County high schools, twice annually, (October - December and March - May) in 10-week sessions.
Mary's Center for Maternal and Child Care, Inc.	\$2,000	Mary's Center for Maternal and Child Care will use grant funds for expenses related to supporting wellness visits for uninsured and under-insured participants in Prince George's County.
Meals on Wheels of the College Park Area, Inc.	\$3,000	Meals on Wheels of the College Park Area will use grant funds for expenses related to providing nutritious meals delivered five days per week to eligible Prince George's County residents; for maintenance and/or replacement of kitchen equipment; for replenishment of food supplies for meals; and for payment of salaries of workers.
NAMI Prince George's County, MD, Inc.	\$2,500	NAMI Prince George's County, MD, Inc. will use grant funds for expenses related to defraying costs for general operating support in its efforts to provide mental health related programs of support, education and advocacy for County residents.
Paint Branch Elementary School	\$1,000	Paint Branch Elementary School will use grant funds for expenses related to purchasing online math intervention tools and providing professional development for teachers to expand and enrich their technology knowledge.

Parkdale High School	\$2,000	Parkdale High School will use grant funds for expenses related to providing tutor stipends, refreshments for program activities, marketing materials, student incentives, office supplies, and speaker/ presenter honorariums.
Pregnancy Aid Centers, Inc.	\$4,000	Pregnancy Aid Centers will use grant funds for expenses related to covering all or any portion of the costs of food (\$4,400) ordered from the Capital Area Food Bank (CAFB) for its Food Pantry and a new charge of \$3,380 from CAFB for food delivery (\$65 / delivery for 52 weeks).
Prince George's Child Resource Center, Inc.	\$3,000	Prince George's Child Resource Center will use grant funds for expenses related to conducting home visiting early intervention for families at risk to neglect or abuse their children, comprehensive family support, and child care provider training.
Prince George's County Police Athletic League, Inc.	\$2,500	Prince George's County Police Athletic League will use grant funds for expenses related to conducting its programs. More specifically, funds will be used to purchase supplies and equipment unique to each program (baseball, tennis, martial arts, basketball, and Leadership & Life Summer Camp).
Prince George's County Police T.E.P., Inc. (no website)	\$1,000	Prince George's County Police T.E.P. (Triad, Explorers & PAL) will use grant funds for expenses related to operate and grow the Explorer Program. More specifically, funds will be used for annual re-charter process with Learning for Life and Boy Scouts of America; for tee shirts for day-today- activities; for travel and admission expenses for training and competitions; for team building experiences and a group dinner; and for recruiting.
Prince George's County Public Safety Assistance Program, Inc. (no website)	\$1,000	Prince George's County Public Safety Assistance will use grant funds for expenses related to purchasing poultry, produce, canned goods and bread to fill Christmas food baskets for eligible Prince George's County residents.
Prince George's Philharmonic	\$1,000	Prince George's Philharmonic will use grant funds for expenses related to supporting its educational outreach programs and its increased production costs of Philharmonic concerts during the 2018 -2019 season. This includes the season finale performance of Gustav Holst's The Planets in Dekelboum Concert Hall at the Clarice Smith Performing Arts Center.
Seabrook Elementary School	\$1,000	Seabrook Elementary will use grant funds for expenses related to conducting exercise classes to promote physical activity and building a school culture of healthy living. More specifically, the funds will be used for free fitness classes after school for teachers.
SEAC, Inc.	\$1,000	SEAC will use grant funds for expenses related to purchasing the #MAP (Math Achievers Program) SEAC will provide an evening math enrichment program on Tuesdays and Thursdays for approximately 20 middle school students in Prince George's County. Participants will meet for individualized and/or in small groups for tutoring twice a week for six weeks, beginning in late June 2019 through mid-August 2019. Tutors will be secured through a local university.
Solutions in Hometown Connections Corporation	\$2,625	Solutions in Hometown Connections will use grant funds for expenses related to funding a staff position critical to the program mission of serving the family as a whole. More specifically, funds will allow the Inter-Generational English Language Program's Preschool Enrichment Activities Specialist to work for two terms (January-April and September-November 2019).

Sustainable Community Initiatives, dba Community Forklift	\$1,500	Sustainable Community Initiatives, dba Community Forklift, will use grant funds for expenses related to increasing donorship to its Home Essentials Program (HELP) to distribute free building materials, appliances and furniture to low-income residents of Council District 3 and to increasing District 3 enrollments into HELP.
Take Charge Juvenile Diversion Program, Inc.	\$3,500	Take Charge Juvenile Diversion Program will use grant funds for expenses related to conducting its Leadership Development/ STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Art and Mathematics) Program to cultivate self-awareness, self-control and leadership qualities while modifying negative behaviors of program participants. The program will be held one day per week after school for eight weeks for three cohorts of students.
The Training Source, Inc.	\$1,500	The Training Source will use grant funds for expenses related to supporting workforce development, youth leadership and job readiness training programs, and community-bases social services for residents of Prince George's County.
The University of Maryland College Park Foundation, Inc	\$1,500	The Clarice Smith Performing Arts Center will use grant funds for expenses related to supporting community concerts at schools and senior centers in Councilmanic District 3.
University Park Elementary PTA	\$1,000	University Park Elementary PTA will use grant funds for expenses related to buying Chromebooks for University Park Elementary School.
Unshackled Ministries, Inc.	\$2,000	Unshackled Ministries will use grant funds for expenses related to conducting a reentry program focused on women returning from jail and prison. The intensive six-month program will focus on mental health counseling, job readiness, parenting skills and life skills to help the women re-acclimate into society and their families.
William Wirt Middle School	\$1,500	William Wirt Middle School will use grant funds for expenses related to purchasing items to promote the physical and mental health of students. The funds will also be used to purchase materials, lessons and professional development opportunities for staff to better understand their students and their needs.
World Arts Focus, Inc., dba Jose's Movement Emporium	\$2,000	World Arts Focus, Inc., dba Jose's Movement Emporium will use grant funds for expenses to providing in-depth dance production experiences for 120 special education high school students through The Ability Project, a multi-disciplinary program for differently-abled individuals.
