100 Black Men of Prince George's County	\$10,000	100 Black Men of Prince George's County will use grant funds to award 10 students \$1,000 scholarships for students with majors in computer science for Fall of 2020.
A Wider Circle	\$10,000	A Wider Circle will use grant funds to fund expenses related to providing furnishings and basic need items for the homes of Prince George's County's most vulnerable residents.
Anacostia Watershed Society, Inc.	\$20,000	Anacostia Watershed Society will use grant funds for expenses related to helping restore natural habitat and improve public parkland, engage youth and their families in recreation, educate students and adults about watershed protection, and reduce pollution in the Anacostia River.
ARC of Prince George's County, Inc.	\$35,000	ARC of Prince George's County will use grant funds for expenses related to supporting programming that promotes community inclusion and independent living for individuals with Intellectual / Developmental Disabilities (I/DD) by preparing them for post-secondary education and employment, and delivering activities that build work / volunteer skills. More specifically, funds will be used for program elements not covered by the Developmental Disabilities Administration (DDA), including the cost of community activities in arts and recreation, and transportation. The funds will also allow the hiring of a new job developer to connect more people to jobs and expand workshops, internships and job training for transitioning youth, including working to add a new Project SEARCH site in the northern part of the County within the next 12 months.
Art Works Studio School, Inc.	\$20,000	Art Works Now will use grant funds for expenses related to supporting two of its most critical programs: the Creative Aging Initiative, which provides arts learning for older adults, and the Ceramics Program, which provides classes for adults and children in wheel-thrown pottery and hand-build ceramics.
Asylum Seeker Assistance Project	\$10,000	Asylum Seeker Assistance Project will use grant funds to provide holistic social services to a minimum of 20 asylum seekers living in Prince George's County, Maryland. Their social service program is designed to address a range of unmet client needs related to health, safety, physical survival and emotional well-being.
Autism FYI Organization Corporation	\$25,000	Autism FYI will use grant funds for expenses related to conducting autism training for members of law enforcement, fire department and EMS, as well as businesses, parents, health care providers, etc. It will also provide the Immediate Recognition Increases Safety (IRIS) free safety program for those with autism and other disabilities.
Beltsville Seventh Day Adventist Church - Beltsville Adventist Community Center (BACC)	\$50,000	Beltsville Seventh Day Adventist Church - Beltsville Adventist Community Center will use grant funds to provide emergency rent, utilities, food and temporary housing, as well as mental health counseling to those in the community who have had a temporary set-back. Funds will also be used to help pay for the salary of a receptionist who is able to welcome and direct clients when they arrive to meet with the DSS agent on site.
Bowie Business Innovation Center, Inc. (BIC)	\$100,000	Bowie Business Innovation Center will use grant funds to cover the cost of the salary for the Bowie BIC Director of Operations and to cover a portion of the management fee for the Bowie BIC Executive Director.
Bowie State University Foundation	\$50,000	Bowie State University Foundation will use grant funds to provide scholarships that will support the enrollment and retention of Bowie State University students that have need for financial assistance.
Bowie State University Scholarships	\$100,000	Bowie State University Scholarships grant funds will be used to provide scholarships that will support the enrollment and retention of Bowie State University.
Brighter Bites	\$10,000	Brighter Bites will use grant funds for expenses related to salaries and personnel expenses associated with implementing its three-pronged, evidence-based program (produce distribution, nutrition education and fun food experiences) in Prince George's County.
Capital Area Food Bank (COVID)	\$65,000	Capital Area Food Bank will use grant funds for the purpose of expanding emergency food and nutrition services programs to residents of Prince George's County who need assistance in light the COVID-19 pandemic.
Capital Area Food Bank - Senior Nutrition Supplemental Funding	\$100,000	Capital Area Food Bank will use grant funds to support their After School & Summer Meals program, providing free, healthy meals and snacks to kids ages 5-17, weekly at partner locations, such as recreation centers, apartments, churches, that host youth enrichment activities after school and in the summer.

CASA de Maryland, Inc.	\$100,000	CASA de Maryland will use grant funds for expenses related to supporting its holistic Workforce Development and Immigrant Integration Program at the Prince George's Welcome Center. The center serves Langley Park and the broader region. More specifically, funds will be used to support the salaries of program staff providing services, as well as associated non-personnel costs such as supplies, instructors and occupancy, making the provision of the services possible.
Catholic Charities of the Archdiocese of Washington - Re-Entry	\$20,000	Catholic Charities of the Archdiocese of Washington will use grant funds for expenses related to conducting its Welcome Home Re-entry Program to help men and women successfully re-acclimate to their home communities after incarceration by providing supportive case management services and mentoring program. More specifically, funds will be used to fund the salary and fringe benefits for the program coordinator, as well as address some indirect program costs.
Catholic Charities of the Archdiocese of Washington (COVID)	\$65,000	Catholic Charities of the Archdiocese of Washington will use grant funds for the purpose of expanding emergency food and nutrition services programs to residents of Prince George's County who need assistance in light the COVID-19 pandemic.
Catholic Charities of the Archdiocese of Washington	\$15,000	Catholic Charities of the Archdiocese of Washington will use grant funds to fund the Catholic Charities Legal Network is a pro-bono legal service providing low-income individuals with general information, access to pro-bono attorneys and law firms, and referrals to other legal service organizations.
Central Kenilworth Ave Revitalization Community Development Corporation, Inc.	\$40,000	Central Kenilworth Ave Revitalization Community Development Corporation will use grant funds for operating expenses incurred in their workforce training program (including culinary and hospitality), new vendor purchasing, rent and other operating expenses.
Champ House Recovery	\$18,000	Champ House Recovery will use grant funds for the Renovation of Decks, staircases and railing on the front and rear of our meeting hall. The environment is a significant part of recovering from addiction. By replacing the current deck and staircase we will provide more modern spaces for the men in recovery as well as the citizens from Prince George's County citizens that use the facility daily.
Chelsea School	\$10,000	Chelsea School will use grant funds for expenses related to expanding the implementation of standing desks in classrooms. More specifically, funds would be used to purchase 35 stand-up desks and stools.
Cheverly American Legion Post 108	\$10,000	Cheverly American Legion Post 108 will use grant funds for expenses related to making capital improvements to its facilities to include ADA-compliant accessibility and restrooms to better serve its veteran community and the community as a whole.
Children and Parent Resource Group, Inc.	\$50,000	Children and Parent Resource Group will use grant funds for expenses related to traveling to 12 middle and/or high schools and conducting 3D interactive assemblies on Safe Teen driving, Bullying, Environmental Awareness, Drugs and Alcohol, and Entrepreneurship.
Chillum Youth Project, Inc.	\$10,000	Chillum Youth Project will use grant funds for expenses related to conducting and supporting its after-school and Saturday educational program for at-risk children in Langley Park.
Christmas in April Prince George's County, Inc.	\$50,000	Christmas in April Prince George's County will use grant funds for expenses related to purchasing materials and supplies to make home repairs in April for eligible Prince George's County residents.
City of District Heights - Family & Youth Services Bureau	\$50,000	City of District Heights - Family & Youth Services Bureau will use grant funds for expenses related to supplementing the salary of one full-time Family Therapist, to supporting the group therapy program in Prince George's County, a teen week-long therapy group during Spring Break (22 hours), and two free college tours.
Coalition for African Americans in the Performing Arts (CAAPA)	\$25,000	Coalition for African Americans in the Performing Arts (CAAPA) will use grant funds for expenses related to facilitating "The Performance Series" for youth, adults, senior citizens, families and veterans. More specifically, the funds will be used for expenses incurred in putting on performances at various venues in Prince George's County, Maryland.
Coalition for Public Safety Training in Schools, Inc.	\$30,000	Coalition for Public Safety Training in Schools will use grant funds for expenses related to supporting the Driver's Education Scholarship Program, providing educational public safety tours for students, providing mentoring, and conducting the Life, Leadership and Social Skills Program, as well as programmatic expenses for events, facilities and equipment, meals and entertainment, media, meeting expenses, professional fees, promotional expenses and training / educational program costs.
Coalition of Concerned Black Christian Men	\$15,000	Coalition of Concerned Black Christian Men will use grant funds for expenses related to supporting its annual scholarship program for Prince George's County high school seniors and for providing food and monetary donations to Prince George's County families in need of assistance.

Community Advocates for Family & Youth, Inc. (CAFY)	\$10,000	Community Advocates for Family and Youth (CAFY) will use grant funds for expenses related to conducting its Court Education Program to prepare child victims and non-offending parents to be comfortable in the courtroom environment (using actual courtrooms or mock trial setups) before they must give sworn testimony. More specifically, funds will be used to help support personnel (victim service professionals, pro-bono legal services and mental health therapist) to carry out the critical work for residents (without charge to them) who are impacted, harmed and affected by crime.
Community Builders, Ltd.	\$50,000	Community Builders will use grant funds for expenses related to summer enrichment and after school programming for elementary and middle school youth to support academic improvement, personal development and healthy lifestyles. Programs include gardening, radio and videography, literacy, chess and tutoring.
Community Crisis Services, Inc.	\$125,000	Community Crisis Services will use grant funds for expenses related to supporting safety net services, including local crisis/ suicide hotlines; domestic violence hotline; emergency shelters; the Safe Passages \$125,000 program; and the Wann Nights program. More specifically, funds will be used for salaries and fringe benefits for people working at the call center and conducting the Safe Passages and Wann Nights programs.
Community Forklift dba Sustainable Community Initiatives	\$75,000	Community Forklift will use grant funds to improve its overall management and operation in three ways: IT infrastructure, branding and marketing, and operational capacity building for two community giving grant programs.
Community Legal Services of Prince George's County, Inc.	\$50,000	Community Legal Services will use grant funds to provide mobile legal services in order to reach out to under-served areas of the county lacking access to legal services. Legal services will include domestic violence, estate planning for seniors, expungement, family law and other civil legal matters.
Community Ministry of Prince George's County, Maryland	\$50,000	Community Ministry of Prince George's County will use grant funding to support their Food Assistance and Anti-Hunger Program which seeks to implement food assistance and anti-hunger activities in areas of Prince George's County that are considered food deserts or are located near food deserts. The program seeks to reduce food insecurity and improve health outcomes of residents in these areas.
Community Youth Advance, Inc.	\$25,000	Community Youth Advance will use grant funds for expenses related to delivering year-round quality academic enrichment, mentoring and college and career readiness activities that promote academic excellence, promote character and prepare youth to meet life's challenges. More specifically, grant funds will be used for expenses related to staffing (including contract staff), food and meals, and transportation. This will help keep these programs free of charge for approximately 600 disadvantaged children and youth. Ten percent will go towards overhead costs.
Court Appointed Special Advocate (CASA) Prince George's County, Inc.	\$100,000	Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA)/ Prince George's County will use grant funds for expenses related to advocating for the physical health, mental health, safe housing educational and social needs of 200 foster youth. At the age of 21, at least 75% will be stably housed and at least 70% will be employed or enrolled in an education program leading to employment. More specifically, funds will be used towards the salaries of professional case supervisors, the deputy director who oversees fundraising, and the program administrator and the marketing team for recruitment and onboarding of volunteers.
Daughter for the Day, Inc.	\$15,000	Daughter for the Day will use grant funds for expenses related to conducting education seminars to prolong the onset of dementia, providing nutritional food samples (wild salmon, asparagus) and delivering fresh produce to low-income seniors in District 8.
Dream Works, Inc.	\$10,000	Dreams Works will use grant funding to support their Farm to Table Food Assistance program, which will provide seniors, veterans, low-income families and children who face food security issues access to healthy and affordable meals.
Ebenezer AME Stone of Help Community Development Corporation (no website)	\$30,000	Ebenezer AME Stone of Help Community Development Corporation will use grant funds for expenses related to partnering with Ebenezer AME Church's Women's Resource and Restoration Center to provide assistance to women and families in crisis, and a young ladies life skills program to advance their overall well-being. More specifically, funds will support the Assistance to Women and Families Program through seminars / workshops and emergency assistance and the Go Get Our Daughters program for girls ages 10 to 18.
EcoLationos, Inc.	\$10,000	EcoLatinos will use grant funds to help mitigate the problems associated with the COVID-19 pandemic by enabling members to reduce the impact of the disease and increase control over their health through the use of effective bilingual communication and outreach.
Educacion Para Nuestro Futuro Founded by Escuela Bolivia	\$20,000	Educacion Para Nuestro Futuro Founded by Escuela Bolivia will use grant funds to produce three episodes of the public service television series, Linea Directa. The Spanish-language programs will be broadcast-throughout Prince George's County by the region's leading Spanish-language station, Telemundo 44.

Educare Resource Center, Inc.	\$10,000	Educare Resource Center will use grant funds for expenses related to Home share service fees, utilities, and operational costs associated with part-time staff salaries and volunteer stipends losses due to COVID-19.
End Time Harvest Ministries (ETHM) Pathways to Career Success Program	\$75,000	End Time Harvest Ministries will use grant funds for their Pathways to Career Success Program, which develops youth academically with a career and college preparation focus, including on-time graduation and preparation for college and workforce entry.
End Time Harvest Ministries (ETHM) Wellness Ambassadors Leadership Program	\$50,000	End Time Harvest Ministries will use grant funds to provide health & wellness workshops/experiential including the multi-dimensional FIT 4 Success Program- HEAL (Healthy Eating, Students also experience career, academic & health assessments & planning-Individual Career Development Planning, & summer internships.
Engaged Community offshoots, Inc., dba ECO City Farms	\$35,000	Engaged Community Offshoots, dba ECO City Farms, will use grant funds for expenses related to growing healthy food and helping Prince George's County increase its delicious, affordable and healthy eating options. In addition, funds will be used for conducting educational group tours at its farms and employing 18-20 county high school students in its SEED2FEED summer youth employment program.
Family Restoration and Healing Center	\$25,000	Family Restoration and Healing Center will use grant funds for expenses related to conducting 360 Wholeness Program education training, workforce development and counseling. More specifically, funds will be used for organization expenses to allow it, in partnership with Community Crisis Services, Safe Harbor Behavioral Care, Solid Rock Church and Vision Impact Center, to expand its efforts on early prevention of domestic violence and enhance individual and family counseling.
First Generation College Bound, Inc.	\$150,000	First Generation College Bound will use grant funds for general operating expenses related to conducting its three programs: Homework Club, College Success and Great Minds Great Futures.
Food & Friends, Inc.	\$100,000	Food & Friends will use grant funds for expenses related to providing medically-tailored, home-delivered meals and groceries to individuals with serious illnesses such as HIV/ AIDS and cancer who are too ill to buy or prepare food for themselves.
Food & Friends, Inc. (COVID)	\$65,000	Food & Friends will use grant funds for the purpose of expanding emergency food and nutrition services programs to residents of Prince George's County who need assistance in light the COVID-19 pandemic.
Friendship Charities Foundation, Inc.	\$50,000	Friendship Charities Foundation will use grant fund to support programs for senior citizens focusing on health, nutrition and wellness and to provide tutoring, mentorship and scholarships to disadvantaged youth in Prince George's County, Maryland.
Game Plan, Inc.	\$10,000	Game Plan will use grant funds for expenses related to providing after-school programming in the areas of project management, career exploration, college readiness and leadership development for Prince George's County public high school students. More specifically, funds will be used for partial stipends for the program coordinator, site coordinator and project management trainer, for the insurance premium required by PGCPSS, and for equipment and program supplies.
GapBuster, Inc.	\$10,000	GapBuster will use grant funds for expenses related to conducting its after-school STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Technology) program, its ESOL (English for Speakers of Other Languages) and GED (General Equivalency Diploma) programs, and for general operating expenses.
Gateway Community Development Corporation	\$10,000	Gateway Community Development Corporation will use grant funds to provide supplemental funds for the Media Arts Lab to reduce the fees paid by artists. The funds will also be used to supplement operating expenses.
Greater Prince George's Business Roundtable, Inc.	\$140,000	Greater Prince George's Business Roundtable will use grant funds for expenses related to furthering the relationship between Joint Base Andrews and Prince George's County. More specifically, the funds will be used for contract payments, professional services, consultants, and for the Prince George's Suite magazine and its efforts to provide a cultural lifestyle outlet for Prince Georgians to appreciate their home.
Greenbelt News Review Archives Project	\$20,000	Greenbelt Archive Project will use grant funds to pay a University of Maryland student to complete the digitization of past issues of the Greenbelt News Review.
Housing Options & Planning Enterprise (HOPE, Inc.)	\$10,000	H.O.P.E. will use grant funds for expenses related to supporting salary and continuous training of HUD certified housing counseling in subject areas such as: credit and budgeting, rentals, foreclosure prevention, and pre-purchase of homes.
Habitat for Humanity Metro Maryland, Inc.	\$50,000	Habitat for Humanity Metro Maryland will use grant funds for expenses related to providing low-income homeowners in Prince George's County with health and safety focused home repair services. Some funding will also be internally allocated to building new construction homes in Prince George's County to be sold to qualified buyers.

Heart of America	\$100,000	Heart of America Foundation will use grant funds for expenses related to transforming learning spaces in one of three nominated Prince George's County public schools: Glenn Dale Elementary School (library makeover), Carrollton Elementary School (outdoor classroom) or Templeton Elementary School (library makeover).
Hillside Children's Center	\$10,000	Hillside Children's Center will use grant funds for expenses related to providing uninterrupted youth development, workforce readiness and career exploration services to more than 500 students across nine Prince George's County Public Schools (PGCPS) for the Academic Year 2019-20.
Hope Connections for Cancer Support, Inc.	\$47,000	Hope Connections for Cancer Support will use grant funds for expenses related to improving the outcomes and reducing the race-based disparities for people with prostate cancer by educating patients and their loved ones about the benefits of early detection and screenings, and by providing targeted emotional support and stress relief for this population. More specifically, funds will be used to recruit county residents to increase prostate cancer screenings and participation in psychosocial cancer care, a new program at Hope Connections for Cancer Support.
Human Services Coalition of Prince George's County DBA Nonprofit Prince George's County	\$50,000	Human Service Coalition of Prince George's County will use grant funds to fund their Capacity Building Services program, which will provide information and educational trainings, advocacy and networking and collaboration opportunities for nonprofit organizations.
In Reach, Inc.	\$30,000	In Reach will use grant funds for expenses related to finalizing its capacity-building project. In Reach 2020, the cornerstone of its strategic plan will allow the organization to execute better K- 12 programs for children, youth and families.
Inncuvate Community Development Partners, Inc.	\$10,000	Inncuvate Community Development Partners will use grant funds for expenses related to supporting a facilitator to walk participants through the training sessions, perform a baseline Prince George's County entrepreneur ecosystem assessment and make the data available via a report and website.
Ivy Community Charities of Prince George's County	\$10,000	Ivy Community Charities will use grant funds to provide youth development programs to help students prepare for college and careers. Grant funds will support high school students who participate in their Institute for the Growth and Development of All of America's Youth program by providing them with extracurricular field trips and scholarships for college.
Kappa Epsilon Lambda Education Fund, Inc.	\$15,000	Kappa Epsilon Lambda Education Fund will use grant funds for expenses related to providing for Alpha Academy (educational development, employment readiness and leadership development) and Project Alpha (workshops and information sessions focusing on personal responsibility and accountability in various areas of life). More specifically, funds will be used for facility rental, honoraria for presenters, for breakfast and lunch for all participants, and for supplies needed for these programs.
Kappa Foundation of Fort Washington	\$20,000	Kappa Foundation of Fort Washington will use grant funds for expenses related to conducting the District 9 health fair (Project Alpha) in 2020. More specifically, funds will be used to pay for facilities, honoraria for service providers, breakfast and lunch for all involved, and for any supplies which might be needed to make it a successful event.
La Clinica del Pueblo, Inc.	\$40,000	La Clinica del Pueblo will use grant funding to meet the healthcare needs of Latino families in Prince George's County through the provision of comprehensive primary care and mental health services that are culturally and linguistically appropriate for residents who are low-income and uninsured.
Latin American Youth Center/MMYC	\$80,000	Latin American Youth Center, Inc./ Maryland Multicultural Youth Center will use grant funds for expenses related to helping the Prince George's County programs serve at-risk and disconnected youth and young adults, especially those who are not enrolled in school or working, to transition to successful adulthood. More specifically, funds will be used for general support to conduct those programs.
Latino Student Fund	\$10,000	Latino Student Fund will use grant funds to support 50 PreK-12 grade students through weekly Saturday tutoring in English, math, and their native language.
Laurel Advocacy and Referral Services, Inc. (LARS)	\$70,000	Laurel Advocacy and Referral Services (LARS) will use grant funds for expenses related to covering the salaries of two full-time case managers who provide homeless outreach, referral services and short-term case management to families and individuals facing a financial crisis.
Laurel Senior Services	\$10,000	Laurel Senior Services will use grant funds to provide non-perishable goods & water to multiple non-profit organizations & faith based organizations that are involved with feeding the homeless, disadvantaged & individuals and families affected by the COVID-19 pandemic health emergency.

Liberty's Promise, Inc.	\$100,000	Liberty's Promise will use grant funds for expenses related to supporting after-school programs of civic engagement at four Prince George's County High Schools (Bladensburg, High Point, Northwestern and Parkdale) twice annually in 10-week sessions. More specifically, funds will be used to pay the salaries and FICA tax for two full-time program officers, four facilitators hired to assist program officers (total of \$16,000), and food and transportation costs for the youth.
Marlton Swim & Recreation Club, Inc. (no website)	\$55,000	Marlton Swim & Recreation Club will use grant funds to provide a pool/aquatic play space for their youngest visitors and their families. The swim and recreation club will now include all ages, allowing for supervised mobility and playtime for the youngest children.
Maryland International Corridor Community Development Corporation dba Northern Gateway Community	\$25,000	Maryland International Corridor Community Development Corporation dba Northern Gateway Community will use grant funds to provide programmatic support to fund Census outreach, particularly two culturally sensitive and language appropriate mailings, and implement tasks required to address area challenges and opportunities. It will also help alleviate costs for staff support, including the hire of a temporary Volunteer recruiter to expand our canvassing efforts.
Mary's Center for Maternal and Child Care	\$20,000	Mary's Center for Maternal and Child Care will use grant funds for expenses related to providing wellness visits for uninsured and under-insured participants in Prince George's County.
Meals on Wheels - Takoma Park	\$10,000	Meals on Wheels of Takoma Park will use grant funds to feed homebound neighbors. Grant funds will also be used to help cover program expenses, particularly after their August 2019 merger with another local Meals on Wheels program, resulting in 40% growth of programs.
Meals on Wheels of the College Park Area, Inc.	\$25,000	Meals on Wheels of the College Park Area will use grant funds for expenses related to purchasing supplies and food items to assist with meal preparation for its clients and preventing the need to increase the price of the daily client contribution for service.
Mission of Love Charities, Inc.	\$50,000	Mission of Love Charities will use grant funds to support services to low-income and homeless individuals in Prince George's County. Services will include provision of furniture, clothing, day center, food, job training, access to computers and mental health services.
NAMI Prince George's County, MD, Inc.	\$20,000	NAMI Prince George's County will use grant funds for expenses related to providing mental health support, education, advocacy and community outreach for county residents.
Naylor Road and Branch Avenue Community Development Corporation (no website)	\$20,000	Naylor Road / Branch Avenue Community Development Corporation will use grant funding to support their mission to equalize access to economic opportunity, alleviate economic disparity, and ensure equal access to government and community resources for individuals, businesses.
Olde Mill Foundation, Inc.	\$10,000	Olde Mill Foundation will use grant funds for expenses related to providing mentoring services, case management and enrichment programs for youth referred for truancy, juvenile complaints for first-time misdemeanor offenses, conflict resolution services for county middle and high schools, and art therapy. More specifically, grant funds will supplement the salary of a full-time administrator and be used to purchase supplies for the Art Therapy and the Saturday Enrichment Programs.
People for Change Coalition, Inc.	\$10,000	People for Change Coalition will use grant funds to support their Nonprofit Technical Assistance Program. The program will be a 6-month capacity building program where nonprofits will participate in workshops to help strengthen their organization.
Pi Upsilon Lambda Charitable Foundation	\$35,000	Pi Upsilon Lambda Charitable Foundation will use grant funds to fund their Youth Leadership Development Institute, which is a mentoring program for middle and high school males. Funds will also be used to support a health and wellness forum that will focus on men's health.
Port Towns CDC	\$15,000	Port Towns Community Development Corporation will use grant funds to support the "Know Your Port Towns: Building Capacity for a Sustainable Future" to strengthen the ability of the PTCDC to develop the research, case materials and data to do more in-depth community development planning.
